AUDIT & REVIEW DIVISION

The **Audit and Review Division** conducts financial audits, attestations, compliance, and performance audits of City programs and operations. Auditors test for appropriate internal controls and compliance with laws, regulations, and other requirements.

Supervisory Review - includes the review by both Deputy Inspector General and First Assistant Inspector General to ensure sufficiency and appropriateness of evidence, adequate fieldwork procedures, and proper conclusions, content, presentation, and readability.

Legal Review - Report review by in-house General Counsel and/or outside Legal Counsel to ensure appropriate and proper legal citations and/or interpretations.

IG Review - Report review by the Inspector General based on corrections and recommended changes resulting from the Legal Review.

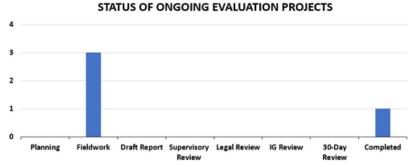

INVESTIGATION DIVISION

OIG seeks information following arrest of City tow truck driver

The New Orleans Office of Inspector General (OIG) and Louisiana State Police Troop NOLA conducted a joint investigation of a City of New Orleans employee who allegedly used his position for personal gain. The investigation revealed that a City tow truck driver was bypassing the official tow process by accepting cash payments in exchange for not towing vehicles.

In late July, that individual was arrested by Louisiana State Police on charges of malfeasance in office, obstruction of justice, and injuring public records. In connection with this case, the OIG is seeking information from anyone who may have been asked to pay cash by a City of New Orleans tow truck driver in exchange for the release of their vehicle.

Contractors lose business licenses and Qualifying Party Status

The Louisiana State Licensing Board for Contractors (LSLBC) revoked the Qualifying Party Status of three contractors along with licenses for two of their associated businesses in a July 17 hearing. Those losing their Qualifying Party Status and licenses include Jon Andersen and his company, Andersen Design + Build LLC and James Louis Jones and Daisy Mae Jones, and their company, JLJ Construction LLC. Contractor Freddie Baker Jr. also lost his Qualifying Party Status at the July hearing. His business, A-Cubed Corp., had previously lost its business license.

In the cases of Andersen and Baker, the revocations were made in connection with alleged fraudulent documents submitted to the New Orleans Department of Safety & Permits. Baker also had numerous state contracting law violations. Regarding the Joneses, the revocations were made in connection with alleged patterns of gross deviation from New Orleans Sewerage and Water Board standards and a series of state contracting law violations.

State appeals court upholds firing of City inspector

Louisiana's Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled July 14 to uphold the City's termination of a former inspector for the Department of Safety and Permits. The inspector was fired following an OIG investigation into improper permitting procedures.

Department of Safety and Permits (DSP) Initiative in review phase

This joint initiative with the Louisiana State Licensing Board for Contractors (LSLBC) is working to identify ways to ensure effective operations of DSP. As part of the initiative, OIG staff have been assigned to DSP to review policies, procedures, and internal controls with a focus on identifying and mitigating gaps and weaknesses. This report is under supervisory review.

INVESTIGATION DIVISION

ONGOING PROSECUTIONS

The Investigation Division also continues to assist in the criminal prosecutions of Leessa Augustine, Tyrell Morris, Gabriel Thomas, and Jeffery Vappie II.

Augustine, a former New Orleans SWBNO Senior Special Agent and reserve NOPD officer, pled guilty June 11 to two counts of wire fraud relating to an emergency benefit, one count of wire fraud affecting a financial institution, and one count of making false statements to investigators. Her sentencing is set for Sept. 16, 2025.

Morris, former Executive Director of the Orleans Parish Communication District (OPCD), was indicted on charges of insurance fraud, malfeasance in office, impersonation of a police officer, and second-degree injuring of public records. Morris is scheduled for trial Aug. 12, 2025.

Thomas, a former SWBNO employee, was arrested by Louisiana State Police's Troop NOLA on Dec. 27, 2024 as part of a joint investigation into brass and copper thefts from SWBNO. An OIG Investigator appeared at a July 9 motions hearing in Orleans Criminal District Court as part of this case.

Vappie, a former NOPD officer, was indicted on seven counts of wire fraud in connection with falsifying NOPD timecards. He was additionally indicted for making false statements to federal agents. His trial is scheduled for December 2025.

An indictment is merely a charge and the guilt of the defendant must be proven beyond a reasonable doubt.

BY THE NUMBERS

During July, the Investigation Division received 16 complaints, opened 2 investigations, and served seven requests for documentation.

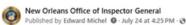
New Orleans Office of Inspector General hed by Edward Michel . July 9 at 12:00 PM - .

The OIG today released a public letter finding the New Orleans Recreation Department (NORD) Commission and NORD Foundation failed to conduct annual audits and sworn financial statements as required by law.

FIGHTING FRAUD TIP OF THE MONTH

Conditions That Can Lead to Fraud

- · Perceived financial pressure
 - Financial strain can motivate someone to commit fraud.
- · Perceived opportunity

An employee must find an area of opportunity to commit fraud. This happens when assets are easy to access or poorly accounted for, and/or proper oversight and internal controls are missing.

Rationalization

If an employee has a perceived need to cheat and sees a way to do so, they might rationalize the cheating. Example: "I deserve a raise; it won't hurt anyone."
